




When winter begins, the birds and squirrels eat the art!




Barney Smith stands in his one-of-a-kind museum (also his garage).

attractions (*n.*) people, things, or types of entertainment that people enjoy (p. 4)

model (*n.*) a usually smaller version of an object made to look like the real thing (p. 11)

monument (*n.*) a building, statue, or other structure built as a memorial to a person or event (p. 9)

museum (*n.*) a building used to store and show things that are important to history, science, or art (p. 7)

odd (*adj.*) strange; different from what is expected (p. 4)

story (*n.*) a level in a building (p. 5)
